INTRODUCTION TO HERBAL

For over a millennia, people have healed with herbal or animal-derived remedies, using knowledge handed down through generations. In Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East, 70-95 per cent of the population still use traditional medicine (TM) for primary healthcare. And some 100 million people are believed to use traditional, complementary or herbal medicine in the European Union (EU) alone — as high as 90 per cent of the population in some countries. (Source: World Health Organisation magazine, 2011)

The WHO (World Health Organization) estimates that 80% of the world's population uses herbal medicine. Research has shown that over 40% of plants comprise key ingredients which can be used for prescription drugs, and researchers look to traditional medicine as a guide to help them.

There are as many as one hundred and twenty compounds which have been taken from the higher plants, and 80 percent of those which are used in modern medicine have a positive connection between their modern and traditional usage.

Natural Medicine or also known as Herbal or Alternative Medicine is a science with generations of experience but with very few specialists in the world qualified to practice or teach this science. You can find many ancient manuscripts in libraries, museums and educational institutes around the world but again only a few that can actually decipher the lost herbal language within then. This program is designed to give seekers a chance to open this locked knowledge and practice it to a good level.

Students will be learning under qualified Herbalists, some with over 30 years of experience. This program includes the study of ancient manuscripts, dating back over 800 years old. The course encompasses classical, theoretical knowledge and traditional, practical methods, which will be taught in a modern way. Graduates from this 3 year program will have mastered the ability to diagnose illnesses and the ability to make herbal remedies, unlocking the historical secrets of Islamic and Greek Herbal Medicine.

BRIEF OVERVIEW OF 3 YEAR PROGRAM

There are many topics that are taught and covered in this unique course, from theoretical to practical. The course covers a comprehensive text of Ibn Sina called the "Urjoozah" that is taught over the 3 years along with 3 semesters in the 3 years that will focus on Herbal remedies, oils, concentrates and complicated remedies known as Majoons. It also delves into herbs, types of herbs, different methods of drying them and their affects on a person's health, from a preventative perspective to a curing perspective.

Those studying on the Ibn Sina Herbal program will be covering both the Tabeeb (Diagnostic) and Hakeem (Pharmacist) aspects of Herbal Medicine. This unique approach gives the students a strong foundation in both sides of Herbal Medicine, giving a the oppurtunity to specialise in either of the two fields. The strong knowledge of the Head Herbalist (Shaykh Atabek) and his years of experience in Herbalist (Shaykh Atabek) and his years of experience in syllabus has been adjusted and developed over the years as to cover these two aspects in detail. 
In each year there will be 3 terms or semesters. In Year 2 you will have 2 Theoretical modules and 1 practical module.


SEMESTER 1 (THEORETICAL) - OVERVIEW

As mentioned before you will study the different chapters of the Urjuzah fi-Tibb of Ibn Sina for the theoretical side of Herbal Medicine. Below is the breakdown of the modules and their chapters you will cover in Semester 1. They are made in a table for you so you can tick them off as you cover them with the herbalist teacher.

*NOTE: Every theory lesson will vary between 1-3 hours depending on how the teacher covers the subject at hand. Lessons will be given once a week, the number of lessons in semester 1 are shown in the calendar (please see year calendar for more info)















The practical side of Herbal medicine covers the making of remedies (Hakeem). In Year 2, Semester 2, similar to Year 1, you will also have a few lessons linked to Ibn Nafis' Encyclopaedia. For these lessons you will be taught a variety of herbs (that are ordered alphabetically according to the Arabic alphabet). You will be given their effects and side-effects, temperament, English/Latin names.




PRACTICAL SESSIONS OUTLINE , HERB AND EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENT

In the 2nd year you will be taught remedy making of Herbal Sharaabs (Drinks), Herbal Carriers and Ruboobs (concentrates). This will be taught by the traditional methods. HOW YOU WILL BE ASSESSED?

You will be summatively assessed in 3 main ways in Year 2:

- Theoretical Exam (This will be a Written Online exam) assessing Theory knowledge and understanding only)
- Practical Remedies (This will be a Practical Exam submitted physically, assessing Practical knowledge and understanding of traditional remedy making)
- 3. <u>Assignment</u> (This will be a written academic assignment, assessing both practical and theoretical knowledge and understanding)

Please Note: You must PASS all 3 of the assessments above to pass Year 2 and proceed to Year 3 (final year). The pass marks for each one is given below in red:

- 1. Theoretical Exam 50%
- 2. Practical Remedies 5 out of 6 remedies
- 3. Assignment 45%

1. THEORETICAL ASSESSMENT PROCEDURE

For the theoretical side of Herbal Medicine you will be assessed at the end of the year via an exam on everything you have learnt in Semester 1 and Semester 3. THE PASS MARK IS 50% FOR YEAR 1. Students MUST achieve this if they want to progress into year 2. (there is no ijazah (sanad) for Yr1 as this will be assessed and given in Yr3).

The exam will be conducted ONLINE in exam conditions. The date of the exam can be seen on the calendar on the last page of this handbook. You, as a student will need to agree to the terms and conditions of the exam before commencing the exam and then the exam will begin. The exam will be timed and you will not be able to use any materials except your laptop/computer during the exam.

2. PRACTICAL ASSESSMENT PROCEDURE

The practical exam is quite different to the theoretical exam. It will practically assess your knowledge and understanding of Semester 2. This will include **making six remedies** from your practical sessions list. You will be required to make these remedies from your homes and send a **quantity of 50ml** of the remedy in an air tight bottle (glass or plastic) to the following address:

Please note, it is the responsibility of the student to make sure they have sealed and packed the remedy appropriately for postage and sent via recorded delivery to the above address. Once your remedy is received by your Herbal Practical Tutor, you will be emailed confirming we have received it. The Tutor will then assess the remedies and test their effects. For the practical assessment you will either receive a "PASS" or "FAIL" for each submitted remedy and you must achieve a pass in 5 out of the 6 remedies to pass overall. Your tutor will use the following format to comment on your remedies and send you this as your results sheet.

3. ASSIGNMENT ASSESSMENT PROCEDURE

The Assignment required in Semester 3 is a 1000 word assignment (+/- 200 words). This should be based on the content you have learnt on the lbn Sina Program as well as your personal academic research on the topic of Herbal or Alternative Medicine. This assignment was deliberately put in before the exams so that it becomes a method of revision for students. They will be reading through their notes and combining this with their research to develop a scholarly paper (assignment) that may be used as a research paper or article that is displayed on the lbn Sina website.

Assignment Brief: You are required to write a 1000 word assignment on one of the ILLNESSES (AL MARD) you studied in the Semester 1 or 3 (Theoretical semesters). You must refer to the information you studied from the Urjuzah of Ibn Sina as well as do your own research on the Illness you choose to study to discover more about it from different perspectives. You can choose any type of illness (eg: diabetes, heart disease, liver disease, alopecia, vitiligo etc). Once you have chosen your illness you then need to apply your herbal knowledge to the illness. You should cover most of the following points for a good mark:

- An Introduction to illnesses What is Al Mard or illness in general according to Greco-Islamic Herbal Medicine (GIHM)?
- What are the main causes of the illness?
- Which regions of the world or types of people are most likely to get the illness (refer to statistics, Iqleems, death tolls, history of any peaks).
- What are the adverse possible effects or symptoms of the Illness?
- What methodology is used by Modern Medicine to cure the illness? (You could use stats to show the level of success of their methods. Side effects of the treatments etc)



- What <u>methodology</u> would GIHM use to cure it? (you could explain the general concept they use and then go into detail of the specific methodology such as damad, marhams, majoons, smoke remedy, etc)
- What possible <u>Herbs</u> would be used to cure it? (you may use the herbal encyclopaedia, your own knowledge/experience and any researchers you can find from reliable sources)
 - You may go into detail about the herbs (where they are cultivated, grown, their side effects etc)
- What is the <u>recovery process</u>? (eg: duration, advises, resting periods, foods they should eat/refrain from)
- What GIHM or other Alternative Medicines would advise to prevent the illness?

This is an academic assignment. As a result, you should <u>reference</u> your research appropriately and add a <u>Bibliography</u> at the end (this will not be included in the word count). You may use a choice between <u>Harvard</u> Referencing or <u>MLA</u> referencing procedures. Ensure to use one and not to switch between the two in one assignment. There is a good link to "How to Write an Academic Assignment" on the student portal to help you with writing assignments.

The Assignment PASS mark is 45%, which is the minimum you must receive to get through to the second year. If you fail the assignment, fail to submit it or have a mitigation circumstance, you will get only 1 opportunity to re-submit the assignment. Note, the highest mark you can receive on re-submission is 45% unless you had a valid and approved mitigating circumstance.

If you fail a second time then you must enrol for the first year again and repeat the year if you are wanting to proceed. Please also note if you fail to submit any of the assessments on time you will automatically receive a '0' or 'Fail' for that particular assessment.
